Throughout her career her creations have complemented the collections of Paul Costelloe, Stella McCartney, Bruce Oldfield, Prada, Anna Valentine, and many more and have appeared regularly in the fashion press, including Cosmopolitan, Tatler and Vogue. Sylvia is also a poet and writer, and her approach is best described in her poem "Two Passions": 'Two passions intertwine. A tangle of fantasies. I make no attempt to unravel them. They burn together like small coals. Sparking my imagination'. Her book "Headfirst" contains an amalgam of couture millinery, poetry (both humorous and romantic) and prose. Partly biographical, the book gives an insight into the eccentric world of hats with just a touch of fantasy.

NEWS FROM OUR GROUPS

WINE GROUP 1

At a meeting earlier this year Wine Group 1 discussed the effects of climate change on wine production.

The boundaries of wine production in Europe are moving northwards. Prime examples are the production of prize-winning

Chardonnay and even Pinot grapes in England.

On the continent, north facing slopes are increasingly being used for vines where previously south facing slopes were dominant. The converse applies in the southern hemisphere.

We tasted two English white wines (Flint Valley and Surrey Gold), both of which all members enjoyed. However, in a blind test no one identified them as English

A social change affecting wine was also discussed, specifically the increased drinking of organic wines. We sampled two red organic wines in blind tests, both from Italy (Nero D'Avola and Terre diFaiano; Primitivo Puglia). Again, all members greatly enjoyed both!

ARCHAEOLOGY

We have had three meetings since our start in February. The first was simply to determine where and when could meet. Later it was decided to use the small hall at Meopham Village Hall.

To start the ball rolling we had a talk on the archaeological discoveries on the Island of Rhodes and at the following meeting we had a very interesting presentation by Nigel Sewell about the recent excavation of the Roman Villa at Trottiscliffe. He also brought along a selection of artefacts which Anne, his wife, assured us was just a fraction of what he has at home!

At that meeting it was mentioned that the Kent Archaeological Society (KAS) website has information about opportunities to take part in digs and this is something to pursue in future months along with possible field walking and other external visits. Our next meeting will focus on Finding the Neanderthal and new discoveries in Meopham.

Oh and by the way a team of six from this group took part in the 2023 Cream Tea Quiz at Culverstone Hall and WE CAME FIRST [and we've got the trophy to prove it!!!]

MUSIC ENSEMBLE

The Music Ensemble group now has six members who between us play piano, flute, guitar, ukulele (2 people) and alto saxophone. We meet monthly in each other's homes and have a go at playing a variety of music. Our current repertoire includes pieces such as:

A sign-up sheet for a new group or another group in the same area can then be created and members can express an interest at a monthly meeting. New groups can also be advertised in the bulletin or via the website in offer to attract potential members.

Once there is sufficient interest and the group is viable then an initial meeting is held and the group gets going.

This may take several weeks, but bear with us, it happens 95% of the time, if enough interest is generated.

Several of the groups highlighted in this bulletin are new groups and this is how they got started.
