Hunterian Museum at the Royal College of Surgeons - from Paul Campion

Members of Meopham How Things Work Group visited the Museum on 21 February and are seen in the photo below surrounding a statue of John Hunter backed by the main staircase featuring portraits of past presidents of the Royal College of Surgeons in Lincoln's Inn Fields.

The College is the HQ of English surgery and has recently been redeveloped at considerable expense, £4.6million alone has been spent on upgrading the Hunterian Museum using both traditional and wonderful modern display techniques.

John Hunter was an 18th century anatomist and surgeon and the museum traces much of the development of surgery to include current examples of robotic and specialist surgery practised today. Much of this is seen through the eyes of Hunter whose prolific efforts to advance anatomical knowledge, medicine and surgery have clearly consumed decades of dedicated hard work and research.

We saw historical collections of healthy and diseased specimens in glass jars and wonderful descriptions of the many surgical instruments on view. Surgical training was clearly described from the early years to films of current surgeons describing their patients and operations.

There are many beautiful portraits, items of furniture and clocks on view and the quality of the presentation is outstanding.

Much of the information is highly detailed and several visits may be required to do it justice. The Hunterian Museum is free and was much enjoyed by the HTW Group.



Meopham u3a Social Team's 2024 Coach Trip to Windsor and Eton – from Mike Chantry

Tuesday May 21st 2024. Approx pick up times 8.30am from one of three pick up points along the Wrotham Road – near Instead Rise, the Church and Culverstone. Returning back at approximately 6.30pm. Cost Just £18.00 on a luxurious Kingsferry 53-seater coach

Visit the historic town of Windsor on a day tour from Meopham. Treat yourself to a visit to Windsor Castle, the Official Residence of His Majesty King Charles. Admire the mighty stronghold, built by William the Conqueror in the 11th century, peek into the royal bedchambers and see Queen Mary's doll house, then stroll the beautiful gardens and enjoy free time in Windsor. Tickets for the Castle and other attractions are not included in the coach ticket price.

Windsor and Eton sit across the River Thames from each other and are easy to explore on foot. A 20-minute foray gets you from Windsor Castle to Eton College, while a 5-minute stroll will take you to the riverside, where you can catch a scenic river cruise. Cabs and local buses are also convenient. Many tourists opt for hop-on hop-off buses, which follow circular routes around and between both towns.

Halfway down Eton High Street, you'll find Tastes Delicatessen, a tiny gem of a store dedicated to fine foods and treats, including local specialties. Take some time to browse shelves crammed with pickles, preserves, and biscuits, and cold cases stuffed full of olives, cured meats, cheeses, and other delicacies. The deli's handmade and super-flaky sausage rolls, and the gloriously scrummy Scotch eggs, are particularly good—and perfect for a picnic overlooking the Thames. 


London Visits 1 – The Glass Heart and Temple Church – from Ann MacEwan

The Glass Heart: "This bold new exploration of glass in the UK brings together for the very first time rarely seen works from key UK collections, celebrating this remarkable material – unforgiving, fragile, strong, sustainable. The Glass Heart will make you think again about glass as we explore how it has illuminated and contained human narratives and ideas."

Temple Church: "The Church is one of the most historic and beautiful churches in London. Here are eight hundred years of history: from the Crusaders in the 12th century, through the turmoil of the Reformation and the founding father of Anglican theology, to some of the most famous church music in London, week by week – music which we invite you to come and hear when you are next within striking distance of the Temple. The Church was built by the Knights Templar, the order of crusading monks founded to protect pilgrims on their way to and from Jerusalem in the 12th century. The Church is in two parts: the Round and the Chancel. The Round Church was consecrated in 1185 by the patriarch of Jerusalem. It was designed to recall the holiest place in the Crusaders' world: the circular Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem. It is a numinous space – and has a wonderful acoustic for singing."

The sails , cap , tail are currently being rebuilt in Suffolk at the Millwrights and a couple of Trustees will be visiting on Tues to inspect .

The plan remains for them to be refitted in the Spring and we hope to have a firm date after our visit .
