Also, don't forget to send our Editor Graham Jansen any content to include in the Bulletin – such as a write up and photographs of a visit your Group has had recently.


That's all for this month, I hope to see you at the monthly meetings, details of the September meeting are elsewhere in this Bulletin.

You do not need to bring anything with you but your smile. Thank you.



VJ Day 80

There was no Monthly Meeting in August so I expect many of you were busy jetting off on holiday, visiting the coast or just relaxing in the garden. I was fortunate enough to be invited to the European film premiere of 'Dongji Rescue' at the Odeon Luxe, Leicester Square, to mark VJ Day 80. I attended in memory of one of my relatives who was a POW on board the Japanese ship 'Lisbon Maru.' The film is based on the real-life incident when the cargo ship transporting around 1,800 British POWs from Hong Kong was torpedoed by an American submarine, in October 1942. It was mistaken for a Japanese troop ship. It tells the story of the rescue made by Chinese fishermen to save over 300 POWs. Members of the Lisbon Maru Memorial Association (LiMMA), were in attendance along with the Chinese UK ambassador who provided a speech prior to the start of the film. Cast and crew were also present. It was a fitting way to mark VJ Day 80.

Cobham Hall August 2025

Two groups of members enjoyed a tour of Cobham Hall in early August.

The Hall is a beautiful red brick mansion dating from 1584 which is right on our door step.

We followed in the footsteps of many English monarchs from Elizabeth 1 to Edward V111 as we toured the hall and discovered that at one time it was home to Frances Stuart, who was the model for Britannia on our coins. Charles Dickens regularly walked through the grounds from his house in Higham to the Leather Bottle pub in Cobham village. In 1883 the Honourable Ivo Bligh, later the 8th Earl of Darnley, led the victorious English cricket team against Australia and brought home the ""Ashes"" to Cobham Hall. Our guide Celia made sure we did not miss the wonderfully decorated Gilt Hall, the silk wall paper, marble fireplaces and Snetzler organ.

After a cup of tea and some of the largest scones ever seen we enjoyed a stroll around the gardens which are undergoing renovation.

If you have never been to Cobham Hall, it is well worth a visit.

Local Nature Appreciation Group trip to Stodmarsh

On the 20th August the Local Nature and Appreciation Group visited the 241-hectare nature reserve in the Stour valley, near Canterbury, managed by Natural England and was created by mining subsidence, which formed the lakes, extensive reedbeds and wet meadows. August is usually quiet bird wise, however, this did not dampen their spirits and they set off towards the wooded area, where an elusive chiffchaff could be heard, with blue and great tits dashing about in the branches looking for their insectivorous lunch. Coots swam lazily through the green algae. On one of the smaller ponds a grass snake appeared briefly before hiding among the reeds. A robin sang from the undergrowth as they made their way along the track and moorhens were spotted along with mute swans in the canal. Numerous swallows and sand martins, were seen along with long-tailed tits and a kestrel hovering in the distance. A sedge warbler and a common whitethroat was also spotted in the bushes. Great-crested grebes, grey heron, cormorants, teal, tufted duck, gadwall, black-haired gulls and little grebe were also noted. Altogether the group saw 26 species. Steve and Hazel thank everyone who attended.



London Visits 1 visit to Hyde Park

On the 27th August members of LV1 met up for their monthly jaunt, this time to Hyde Park, organised by Karen Furlong and Liz Millard. Karen guided them carefully as they entered near the Elizabeth Gates and the Achilles Statue and gave them details of the history of the park as they moved through the grounds of the 350-acre site of the world-famous Royal Park. It is a Grade 1 listed urban park in Westminster and is easily accessible on foot or by public transport. It has been a Royal Park for hundreds of years since Henry VIII acquired it for hunting. James I used it for courtiers and socialites and then Charles I opened it to the general public in 1637.

They passed through the Rose Garden with more sculptural delights and stunning flower beds, stopping for drinks at the Serpentine Bar. The walk continued along the Serpentine (designed by Queen Charlotte, a keen gardener). The group then stopped at Princess Diana's Memorial where children and adults were enjoying the water before going onto Peter Pan's statue and lunch at the Italian Gardens, lovingly designed by Prince Albert for Queen Victoria. Here the group sat in the Queen Anne's Alcove to view the scenery and to enjoy each other's company. They then passed the statue of Edward Jenner and the last stunning sculpture was by Henry Moore with the view up to Kensington Palace. What a Royal landscape where hundreds of visitors were able to find pleasure in the wonderful space, experience beauty in the natural world and see creatures of all types, nurtured, and cared for by the Royal Parks. Royal Ballet and Opera House: London Visits 3



On Thursday 28 August, ten of us from LV3 went on a fascinating backstage tour of The Royal Ballet and Opera House in the heart of London's Covent Garden. It is the third theatre on the site, with its historic beginning in 1788 when John Rich, actor/manager at Lincoln's Inn Fields (and a famous Harlequin) commissioned the Beggar's Opera from John Gay. Following the success of this venture, he decided to build the first Theatre Royal at Covent Garden. This opened in December 1732 but was destroyed by fire in 1808. Its replacement burnt down in 1856. The current building opened in 1858 as the Royal Italian Opera and became The Royal Opera House in 1892.


To start our tour, our guide led us through an area with photos and busts of famous opera and ballet stars through the ages as well as models of stage sets from various productions. From here we went to the front stalls, from which vantage point the stage looked enormous. We left the auditorium via a smoking room created especially for King Edward VII, with a door so narrow as to prevent ladies wearing the fashionable wide dresses of the time from joining him!

We followed our guide through a maze of corridors (colour coded to aid navigation) and looked down on the huge lifts which raise such enormous items of scenery as the 'Nutcracker' Christmas tree. We continued to a ballet rehearsal studio where we could examine pointe shoes (they get through 6000 pairs a season apparently!) and tutus, stored on a tutu tree.

From there we visited a large craft studio featuring items from productions past and future and then on to the backstage area which was quite simply enormous. They were busy laying a floor made to look like marble for the forthcoming new production of Tosca.

In traditional fashion, we exited via the gift shop and reluctantly rejoined the real world.
