Introduction

This song was a big hit for The Animals in 1964, but has much older folk music origins. Other key recordings include those by Leadbelly, Joan Baez and Bob Dylan.



This song has a rolling feel with two beats in each bar and each beat divided into three. In proper music terms this is called 6/8 time, as we saw for 'This Year's Love' (page 68) and 'Can't Help Falling In Love' (page 126). What this means is that you could either play each chord twice, slowly, each time it's written, or play each chord with six faster strums in each bar. I would recommend using all down-strums though to make sure you get a good groove, regardless of whether you are doing two or six strums in the bar.



This song is also very good fun to play using fingerstyle using the 6/8 pattern T 1 2 3 2 1, where T is the Thumb and plays the bass note and the 1st, 2nd and 3rd fingers play the third, second and first strings respectively. Playing fingerstyle really helps you make sure that your chord grips are good, because as you play the notes one at a time, there is no hiding a dead note! There is a full lesson on fingerstyle in Stage 9 of the beginners course, lesson BC-193.
